Attorney ad litem helps Charlotte find her forever home

tephanie Johnson, the managing attorney for Legal Services of North Florida's Tallahassee office, left her office one day in 2020 to meet a new client. She headed to a day care center where she was introduced to four-year-old Charlotte*.

"She was really quiet and really hesitant to talk to me," Johnson said. "I'm just some stranger who showed up. So, I said, 'Do you like to read?' She said, 'I do,' so we read *Frog and Toad* together. She had attention issues,



so it was a lot of work keeping her engaged, but she just was so thankful to have somebody give her attention. She was the sweetest kid."

Charlotte was in foster care, one of more than 20,000 children in Florida who have been removed from their homes. In her foster home, she was placed on multiple psychotropic medications, setting into motion a process that made Johnson her attorney ad litem.

Johnson averages a case load of about 40 clients like Charlotte. As an attorney ad litem,

she is responsible for advocating for the best interests and wishes of a child. Her work is supported by a Children's Legal Services grant from The Florida Bar Foundation.

After meeting Charlotte, Johnson got to work on her case. Charlotte and her three younger siblings had been removed from their home due to their parents' drug use. In their foster home, the foster mother was requesting that Charlotte be removed because she could not handle Charlotte's behavioral issues along

March board of directors meeting report

he Florida Bar Foundation Board of Directors met in Lakeland on March 10, 2023, at Florida Southern College. The Foundation is grateful to Florida Southern College for hosting and especially grateful to former Foundation president Stephen Senn and his law firm Peterson & Myers for facilitating the visit with the college and for sponsoring a reception at the Polk Museum of Art. This hospitality and generosity allowed the Foundation to save considerable money and expenses associated with its committee and board meetings. The major actions of the board and reports received included:

Election of Foundation directors

The board ratified the Nominating Committee's selection of Ayana Barrow and Joseph Kadow to fill two seats for three-year terms beginning July 1, 2023. Ms. Barrow is a lawyer actively involved in the Young Lawyers Division of The Florida Bar, and Mr. Kadow is the former Executive Vice President and Chief Legal Officer for Bloomin' Brands, Inc.

It was also reported that Sarita Courtney Baigorri and Brian Currie were appointed by The Florida Bar to each serve a second, three-year term on the board. The Foundation also notified the Bar of two open seats left vacant by Craig Waters' resignation and Maria Gonzalez's selection as the Foundation's Second Vice President. It is expected that the Bar will fill these seats at its May meeting.

Report of the Medal of Honor Awards Committee

The board ratified the selection of David B. Rothman, Esq., as the Foundation's 2023 recipient of its Medal of Honor Award for a Lawyer. The committee did not recommend a non-lawyer recipient.

The board also ratified the selection of Kimberly L. Rodgers, Esq., executive director of Community Law Program, as this year's recipient of the Jane Elizabeth Curran Distinguished Service Award.

The Foundation will host an award ceremony and breakfast in conjunction with The Florida Bar annual convention in June. Sponsorships and tickets are available.

Administration of Justice Grants Awarded

The Improvements in the Administration of Justice (AOJ) grant program is designed to improve areas within the broader framework of the justice system, with emphasis on the process of operating the courts in an effective and expeditious manner. It has historically been used to fund programs that are not otherwise or regularly funded in the Foundation's other grant programs.

The board approved an allocation of \$900,000 to fund AOJ projects this fiscal year, which represents a \$100,000 increase over last year's allocation. The Foundation received 13 applications requesting a total of \$2,209,073. Last year, the Foundation received nine applications requesting a total of \$991,042. As such, a \$191,042 shortfall between the Foundation's allocation of \$800,000 and the "ask" existed last year (23% delta). This year's shortfall increased to \$1,309,703 between the Foundation's \$900,000 allocation and the total "ask" from all applicants (145% delta). Put another way, while applications increased by 44% (9 vs. 13), the amount requested increased by 222%. These differences and disparities presented more challenges to the review team.

Directors Brian Currie, Maria Gonzalez, Mike Tein and Hon. Stefanie Moon, along with staff, independently reviewed and scored the applications and thereafter conferenced to review the results and make recommendations for funding. The scoring group recommended, and the board approved, six awards totaling \$900,000. The six projects receiving AOJ awards are listed in the chart on this page.

Report on Loan Repayment Assistance Program

Pursuant to the terms of the Loan Repayment Assistance Program (LRAP) and individual loan agreements between the Foundation and eligible participants, the board took up the matter of its 2022 LRAP loans. In 2022, the board approved LRAP loans to 205 qualified attorneys totaling \$1,024,663. Upon fulfilment of the terms and conditions of their promissory notes, participants are eligible for

with the other three children.

Charlotte's speech was also delayed, and testing showed that she was developmentally behind. Her day care reported that she was low functioning and stole items from others.

Johnson began helping to select a specialized therapeutic foster home for Charlotte. Foster parents who have this type of home complete dozens of additional hours of training and are reimbursed by Medicaid for services that help with "emotional, behavioral, or psychiatric problems in a highly supportive, individualized, and flexible home setting," according to the Florida Agency for Health Care Administration.

"We were desperately trying to keep her out of any group home because of her age," Johnson said.

At the same time, Charlotte's biological mother was working to regain custody. She was ordered to get dialectical behavior therapy for a personality disorder, but was unable to find a therapist. She scheduled visits with Charlotte, but didn't consistently show up.

In December of 2021, a specialized therapeutic foster home became available for Charlotte in Duval County. She was placed with Jessica and Chelsea Griffith, a teacher and a Chick-fil-A director.

"They were phenomenal with her right from the beginning," Johnson said. "They were just so patient with her. From the get go, she blossomed."

Jessica previously worked as a guardian ad litem and a juvenile probation officer.

"I was trying to advocate and represent and build relationships with children while only having a piece of the picture," she said. "It just felt like I wasn't making the most impact."

So, the Griffiths decided to become foster parents. After reviewing several cases in need of specialized therapeutic foster homes, Charlotte's stood out to them. They added pink sheets, a pink carpet and an easel to a room they had ready.

"I'm sure on the inside, she was just as nervous as we were, probably more, but that first night she fell asleep watching Frozen, and it was actually a really peaceful night, " Chelsea said. "She was just the sweetest."

As Charlotte adjusted to her new foster home, her communication skills improved and she was weaned off of the psychotropic medications. She began swimming and playing soccer, and had regular visits with her siblings.

Six months into her placement, a judge asked the Griffiths if they were considering adoption. They said yes.

But, Charlotte was doing so well that Florida's Department of Children and Families decided she wasn't in need of a therapeutic foster home any longer. They planned to cut funding for it and move her out of the Griffiths' home.

Knowing that wasn't what Charlotte wanted or in her best interest, Johnson got a court order that required DCF to continue Charlotte's placement and pay for it.

"Charlotte could have been moved," Jessica said. "Just knowing what Stephanie could accomplish as an experienced attorney who had respect and rapport within the courtroom...she was the best for handling that. Without her, the case could have been delayed, [and Charlotte's] placement could have been changed."

Johnson also helped put together Charlotte's Individual Education Plan for kindergarten. The Griffiths were grateful for Johnson's in-depth knowledge of Charlotte's background and her ability to relay pertinent information to the school and courts.

"Stephanie was able to lend insight and connect different people, monitoring the situation and communicating with us," said Jessica.

That summer, Charlotte's biological parents were arrested again. Her mother agreed to terminate her parental rights. Her father asked to go to trial, after which the court terminated his parental rights. The Griffiths met Charlotte's father afterward, showing him pictures and expressing their intent for Charlotte to maintain healthy relationships with her biological family. Her father did not appeal, and the Griffiths officially adopted Charlotte this March.

"Stephanie touched this child's life, and helped us help Charlotte," said Jessica. Charlotte has found her forever home.

Children's Legal Services Grant Highlights

Nine legal aid providers were awarded Children's Legal Services grants in 2022. Grants ranged from \$50,000 to \$150,000. 1,554 cases were opened during the first half of the grant term.

consideration for forgiveness of those loans.

The board adopted and approved the Grants Committee's recommendation (based on staff's detailed report) which provides for:

1. Forgiveness of LRAP loans to 159 participants totaling \$770,160;

2. Recission of \$175,999 in unused LRAP awards by 49 participants that fully or partially declined their LRAP loans or defaulted prior to second disbursement; and

3. Acceptance of repayment from 26 participants that defaulted on their 2021 LRAP loans totaling \$78,504.

Foundation selects Paul Doyle Children's Advocacy Award Recipients

The Paul Doyle Children's Advocacy Award honors Paul C. Doyle, founding director of the Foundation's Legal Assistance for the Poor and Law Student Assistance Grant Programs (1991 to 2013) in recognition of his commitment to high-quality legal representation of Florida's low-income children; for encouraging grantee programs to collaborate across geographic regions in order to bring the benefit of legal advocacy to low-income children regardless of their county of residence; for his strong and consistent support of grantees; and for a career dedicated to promoting high-quality legal representation of the poor. The purpose of the award is to recognize and encourage systemic legal advocacy on behalf of low-income children by any non-profit, philanthropic organization whose mission is similar to the Foundation's, who is currently involved in projects directly affecting children's issues, and who meet the award's qualitative and other criteria.

A committee, chaired by former Foundation president Juliette Lippman, selected Seminole County Bar Association Legal Aid Society's Foster Youth Disability Advocacy Project as the winner. First runner-up was Florida Health Justice Project and second runner-up was Americans for Immigrant Justice.

In addition, pursuant to recent amendments to the selection criteria for this award, the selection committee noted that Florida Health Justice Project is a first-time applicant for this award and is therefore entitled to a \$1,000 "newcomer's" award. The committee requested approval of a newcomer's award to FHJP in addition to its first runner-up award.

The board ratified the selection of award recipients who will be recognized at the Foundation's annual award ceremony in June. Along with Ms. Lippman, the Foundation thanks Directors Brian Currie, Kevin McCoy, Maria Gonzalez, Sarita Courtney Baigorri, Hon. Stefanie Moon and retired Justice Peggy Quince who also served as members of the committee.

Report of the Overall Review Ad Hoc Committee

Immediate Past President Connie Bookman reported on the work of the committee, which was created to study, review and make recommendations to the board regarding the Foundation's brand, name, mission, mission statement and messaging. This committee has met 10 times since its creation. The group initially studied its purpose and charge, set out to identify and articulate the Foundation's current challenges and aspirations for meeting those challenges, and then recommended:

1. The Foundation's mission does not need to be and should not be changed;

2. The Foundation's mission statement should be changed and clarified;

3. The Foundation should adopt and use a fictitious name that better reflects its mission and purpose;

4. The Foundation should endeavor to change and refine its messaging; and

5. The Foundation should create, develop or refine its brand to reflect the changes above.

These recommendations were approved by the board on June 23, 2022. Thereafter, the group broke into two subgroups, with one focused on the Foundation's mission statement and the other focused on the possible adoption of a fictitious name and tagline. It was decided that the mission statement group would proceed first because the name and tagline would be influenced by the mission statement.

The mission statement subgroup met several times afterwards and considered multiple proposed mission statements. Ultimately, the committee's vice-chair, Gary Yordon, spent considerable time researching and drafting mission statements that would best describe the work that the Foundation sets out to do. On February 20, 2023, the committee met, discussed Gary's recommendations, and voted to recommend to the Foundation board that the Foundation's mission statement be changed to, "To increase access to the justice system for people of limited means, The Florida Bar Foundation funds legal services, develops innovative tools and programs, and supports legal aid providers and the courts."

The Board adopted the committee's recommendation. The committee will continue with its work regarding the possible adoption of a fictitious name and report back at the board's next meeting.

Next Meeting

The Board's next scheduled meeting will be in conjunction with The Florida Bar's Annual Convention in Boca Raton in June.



Message from 2021-22 President Connie Bookman

RESEARCH was the theme during my year in leadership! I distinctly remember daily feelings of awe and gratitude for the incredible mind bank and giftedness that attorneys and public members offered in moving the mission of The Florida Bar Foundation forward. No decision was ever made without thorough investigation and discussion. Because of that commitment, the Foundation is standing at its leanest and strongest ever.

The creation of FIVE Ad Hoc committees enhanced our commitment of transparency and inclusiveness in all of our policy making.

The **Overall Review Committee** studied, reviewed and made recommendations regarding the Foundation's brand, name, mission and mission statement. A daunting task for 14 committed members! Fortunately, the Emmy Award-winning Gary Yordon guided us in these five decisions:

• The mission does not need to be and should not be changed;

• The mission statement should be changed and clarified;

• Adopt and use a fictitious name that better reflects our mission and purpose;

• Endeavor to change and refine our messaging; and

• Create and refine our brand to reflect the changes above.

The **Audit RFP Ad Hoc Committee** was charged with overseeing the planned periodic review of the Foundation's current auditor and possible replacement. A request for proposal to 21 selected auditor firms

was prepared. Ultimately, four finalists were identified and interviewed, with the committee recommending the retention of Carr, Riggs & Ingram (CRI) as the Foundation's new annual auditor.

The Paul Doyle Children's Advocacy Award Criteria Review Committee and the Goldstein-Van Nortwick Award Selection Committee reviewed the selection and qualifications criteria for the awards and recommended changes for consideration.

The Grants Committee formed the **EJW Policy Ad Hoc Committee** to develop a formal policy relating to the Foundation's funding and participation in the Equal Justice Works program. The Grants Committee also recommended and the board approved in concept, the development of a policy regarding receipt, processing, and administration of donations.

Eight grant programs were approved for funding of \$5,880,000 during my year.

The Foundation's FY 2021-22 operating budget was presented and approved by the board in the amount of \$2,579,365, which represented a 10.5% reduction from the Foundation's FY 2020-21 operating budget. Actual spending for FY 2021-22 was \$2,159,709, which was \$419,656 or 16% below budget. Now, that's great work!

After three years of intense work and study, the Long-Range Technology Plan of the **Technology and Training Committee** was approved. To streamline operations of the Foundation, the majority of technology assets




were transferred to legal aid organizations that are better equipped to maintain and run them.

IOTA Rule implementation



Those efforts included consideration of either terminating, renegotiating or sub-leasing the Foundation's current rented space. Exciting times for the Foundation!
